WELCOME AND MAY THE LORD BLESS US ALL THE LITURGY OF THE PALMS

First Reading: Isaiah 50:4-9a

Comments: The servant of the Lord submits to suffering"

Our reading tells of the servant who speaks for the Lord and suffers persecution, but still trusts in God's help and vindication. This is the third of the "servant songs" that come from a period late in Israel's exile. The servant might be thought to be the faithful of Israel, the prophet himself, or another historical or idealised figure. The people are weary and tired of the Lord's calling, but the servant steadfastly continues. Christians have long perceived in these words a foretelling of Jesus' mission.

Psalm 31:9-16

A psalm of trust by one who looks to the Lord for mercy and protection.

Second Reading: (The Epistle) Philippians 2:5-11

Comments: "Humbled to the point of death on a cross"

From one of the earliest Christian hymns we hear how Christ Jesus accepted the condition of a servant, was obedient even to the point of death, and was then given the name above every name. It is possible that this poem was adapted by Paul or another disciple from the hopes for a saviour of a people who did not yet know Jesus. He has fulfilled humanity's dream of one who will share fully in the mortal condition before his exaltation. To him every knee shall bow, and every tongue confess the great name of the Lord now known in person, Jesus.

The Gospel Mark: 11:1-11

Comments: "Jesus' Triumphal Entry into Jerusalem"

Jesus approaches the holy city of Jerusalem, and his disciples sing praises to God in anticipation of the coming of a new kingdom of David. He has a colt brought to him, and, as did the kings of old in royal celebrations, Jesus rides on it, while his followers spread their garments and leafy branches in the way and shout: "Hosanna," Here is great drama as he enters the city and temple he would save, but there is also acute irony for those who know what lies ahead.

Note further that this year is Year 1, and the readings for Monday, March 29th, 2021 are Jeremiah 12:1-16, Psalm 51:1-18, and Philippians 3:1-14.
