Blessed is the coming kingdom of our ancestor

David! Hosanna in the highest heaven!"

Then he entered Jerusalem and went into the temple; and when he had looked around at everything, as it was already late, he went out to Bethany with the twelve.

The Sixth Sunday in Lent: YEAR B
The Sunday of the Passion: Palm Sunday

THEME FOR THE WEEK

As we witness the death of Jesus, we give thanks for the grace he has earned for us this Lent.



First Reading: Isaiah 50:4-9a

Comment: "The servant of the Lord submits to suffering"

Our reading tells of the servant who speaks for the Lord and suffers persecution, but still trusts in God's help and vindication. This is the third of the "servant songs" that come from a period late in Israel's exile. The servant might be thought to be the faithful of Israel, the prophet himself, or another historical or idealized figure. The people are weary and tired of the Lord's calling, but the servant steadfastly continues. Christians have long perceived in these words a foretelling of Jesus' mission.

Psalm: 31:9-16

Comment: "Into your hands, O Lord, I commend my spirit" (*Ps.31.5*)

A Psalm of trust by one who looks to the Lord for mercy and protection.

Second Reading: Philippians 2:5-11

Comment: "Humbled to the point of death on a cross"

From one of the earliest Christian hymns we hear how Christ Jesus accepted the condition of a servant, was obedient even to the point of death, and was then given the name above every name. It is possible that this poem was adapted by Paul or another disciple from the hopes for a saviour of a people who did not yet know Jesus. He has

fulfilled humanity's dream of one who will share fully in the condition before his exaltation. To him every knee shall bow and every tongue confess the great name of the Lord now known in person. Jesus.

At the Blessing and Distribution of the Palms: Mark 11:1-11

Jesus approaches the holy city of Jerusalem, and his disciples sing praises to God in anticipation of the coming of a new kingdom of David. He has a colt brought to him, and, as did the kings of old in royal celebrations, Jesus rides on it, while his followers spread their garments and leafy branches in the way and shout "Hosanna." Here is great drama as he enters the city and temple he would save, but there is also acute irony for those who know what lies ahead.

The Holy Gospel: Mark 14:1-15:47 (To be narrated only at 9:00 a.m.)

Our gospel is the story of Jesus' anointing in Bethany, his last supper with his disciples, what took place in the garden of Gethsemane, the trial before Pilate, and his final suffering and death.

1. BICENTENNIAL CELEBRATIONS - CATHEDRAL REVITALIZATION 2024 and Beyond: Through Mission, Ministry, Maintenance and Money, this

campaign promises to provide occasions to revitalize the Cathedral's heritage; to strengthen congregational vitality; and to build the Church for tomorrow. All are invited to get involved and to recommend the programme to others, especially persons who were nurtured in this sacred place.

- i. **Mission:** There is a plan to reach the children who were baptized in the Cathedral since September 29, 2006 and to invite them to worship during May, Child-month. Parents, grandparents and godparents are asked to play a key role in this initiative.
- ii. **Ministry:** In the month of April, members and friends will be asked to submit their Top 20 Hymns (T20 Hymns) and contribute twenty dollars (\$20.00). At a time to be announced, there will be an occasion to sing the favourite hymns of the Cathedral.
- iii. **Maintenance:** Repairs to the northern balcony and beautification of the graveyard have started.
- iv. **Money:** The Cathedral, like all institutions, needs money in order to fulfil its mission and ministry. The following approaches will be pursued:
 - A). Proportionate Giving All members are asked to contribute from their personal resources as a sign of their devotion to the Lords' work on a regular schedule. The Biblical Tithe is a standard by which we measure our offerings. However,

even if one is not at that level yet, it is the principle of percentage giving that is encouraged.

- B). Gifts in celebration of this significant milestone would be greatly appreciated. In particular, there is a two hundred dollar (\$200.00) challenge to each member, to be presented at this year's Patronal Festival, September 29, 2024.
- C). There will be an appeal to the general public to support the Cathedral financially. Donation Cards will be prepared and members will be invited to solicit donations from relatives, friends and well-wishers. Thanks in anticipation of your cooperation and generous gifts.


