A reading from the Word of God written in the Book of Genesis, the fifteenth chapter, beginning at the first verse.

The word of the LORD came to Abram in a vision, "Do not be afraid, Abram, I am your shield; your reward shall be very great." But Abram said, "O Lord GOD, what will you give me, for I continue childless, and the heir of my house is Eliezer of Damascus?" And Abram said, "You have given me no offspring, and so a slave born in my house is to be my heir." But the word of the LORD came to him, "This man shall not be your heir; no one but your very own issue shall be your heir." He brought him outside and said, "Look toward heaven and count the stars, if you are able to count

them." Then he said to him, "So shall your descendants be." And he believed the LORD; and the LORD reckoned it to him as righteousness.

Then He said to him, "I am the LORD who brought you from Ur of the Chaldeans, to give you this land to possess." But he said, "O Lord GOD, how am I to know that I shall possess it?" He said to him, "Bring me a heifer three years old, a female goat three years old, a ram three years old, a turtledove, and a young pigeon." He brought him all these and cut them in two, laying each half over against the other; but he did not cut the birds in two. And when birds of prey came down on the carcasses, Abram drove them away.

As the sun was going down, a deep sleep fell upon Abram, and a deep and terrifying darkness descended upon him.

When the sun had gone down and it was dark, a smoking fire pot and a flaming torch passed between these pieces. On that day the LORD made a covenant with Abram, saying, "To your descendants I give this land, from the river of Egypt to the great river, the river Euphrates."

Comment: "The covenant with Abram and his

descendants"

Our Hebrew scripture lesson tells of the promise of many descendants and of a covenant guaranteeing a homeland which God made with Abraham (who at that time was known as Abram). Abram had no children and was planning that one of the slaves born in his house would be his heir. Now he puts his faith in God and is accepted into a right relationship with the Lord. A covenant is then established by means of an ancient custom. Animals are divided in half and, in the form of smoking and flaming symbols, God passes between them.

Psalm 27

The psalmist expresses great trust and confidence in the Lord and asks always to be in God's presence.

Second Reading: (**The Epistle**): Philippians 3:17—4:1 **Comment:** "Our citizenship is in heaven, from where we expect a Saviour"

In this reading Paul warns of enemies of the cross of Christ and urges the disciples in Philippi to stand firm in the hope of the glory to come. Previously, Paul has told how he had learned to count all privileges of birth and background as of no value in comparison with faith in Jesus. He asks the Philippians to imitate him, and to be wary of those who glory in material appetites and values, whether religious or otherwise. Christians are to see themselves already as citizens of heaven, expecting Christ to come and to transfigure their present bodies into the form of their Lord's own resplendent existence.

The Holy Gospel: Luke 13:31-35

Comment: "I have desired to gather Jerusalem as a hen gathers her brood"

In our Gospel, Jesus is disdainful of King Herod's threat and expresses his determination to fulfil his prophetic destiny in Jerusalem. Jesus' words emphasize his struggle against the forces of evil and illness and his expectation concerning what will soon happen to him in Jerusalem. He laments over the city, once chosen for God's temple, which has killed so many prophets before him.

EPIPHANY WATERS:

A high point in the Cathedral's Epiphany Carol Service is the blessing of water, in the font. Epiphany water is a special kind of water. The process involves two exorcisms, making it stronger than other holy waters. This ritual uses salt and water, similar to regular holy water. However, it is accompanied by prayers and actions meant to cast out evil spirits. Epiphany water stands out because it combines basic elements like salt and prayers to cast out all that is evil. The practice of mixing these elements reminds us of life's everlasting battle between good and evil. At times, the faithful call upon figures like **Caspar**, **Balthasar**, and **Melchior** – the three wise men – for their blessing and protection.

It is believed that this type of water holds great power in the Christian tradition. It is a symbolic tool against Satan and a sign of protection. In addition, like other holy water, it is a sign of God's blessing presence among the faithful. People keep it in their homes; use it to sprinkle their homes; or to bless themselves.

Water is always seen in Christian theology as a means of **purification**, and so we ask God to **cleanse** us every time we use holy water. Below is a short prayer that is taken directly from **Psalm 51**, and perfectly summarizes the symbolism found in using holy water to bless ourselves.

Sprinkle me, O Lord, with hyssop, and I shall be cleansed; wash me, and I shall be made whiter than the snow. Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me.


